Conference Registration and Membership

Advanced registration is available online until March 23 at kansaba.org or through the USPS postmarked by March 20 and sent to the Kansas Association for Behavior Analysis, Department of Applied Behavioral Science, University of Kansas, 1000 Sunnyside Avenue, Lawrence, KS 66045. Registration includes annual conference-to-conference KansABA membership; admission to the conference's Career and Education Fair (see below); snacks and drinks throughout the conference; and lunch. For KansABA membership independent of the conference, write kansasaba@gmail.com. The costs of membership and registration for the conference are broken down below.

KansABA membership dues are as follows: Full Members, \$25; Full Members reside in Kansas or the Kansas City metropolitan area and meet the requirements for full membership in the Association for Behavior Analysis International (ABAI). Adjunct Members, \$20; Adjunct Members reside in Kansas or the Kansas City metropolitan area, but do not meet the requirements for full membership in ABAI. Student Members, \$10; Student Members reside in Kansas or the Kansas City metropolitan area and meet the requirements for student membership in ABAI.

Pre-registration for KansABA is as follows: Full Members, \$35, Adjunct Members is \$30 and Student Members is \$20.

On-site registration begins at 8:30 a.m. and closes at 1:30 p.m. On-site rates are an additional \$5 at each membership category. Cash, checks, and credit cards are accepted.

KansABA members may apply for reduced-rate "chapter/adjunct" membership status in ABAI. It provides ABAI member benefits, but not a subscription to *Perspectives on Behavior Science* or ABAI voting privileges. Among the benefits of chapter/adjunct membership are the ABAI conferences, continuing education at the conferences or through ABAI's online Learning Center, and access to job postings, liability insurance, and a practitioner journal.

Business Meeting

At its Business Meeting, KansABA will present reports by its Executive Council and committee chairs and hold elections for incoming executive council and committee chairs. All KansABA members are welcome and encouraged to attend the Business Meeting.

Poster Session

KansABA will have a poster session for undergraduate and graduate student research and scholarship in behavior analysis. Students submit a title page (e.g., title, authors) and a 250-word abstract to kansasaba@gmail.com by April 6 under the subject line, "Poster Submission." They will be notified about their acceptance by March 16. The abstracts and posters must adhere to the field's ethical standards (see J. S. Bailey and M. Burch [2016]. Ethics for Behavior Analysts [3rd ed.]. New York: Routledge). The presenting author must register for the conference. The posters will be set up between 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. in the West Lobby or West Meeting Room. Awards will be given for the best posters as judged by the conference's presenters. Posters must not have been presented previously at the KansABA conference.

Continuing Education Units and Certificates of Attendance

Behavior Analysis Certification Board (BACB) continuing education units (CEUs) will be offered for the five main presentations, that is, all but Wasmer's short session, opening remarks, and closing comments. The CEUs are \$50 for the entire conference; they cannot be purchased for individual presentations. They may be purchased online until April 20 at KansABA.org or through the USPS postmarked by April 17 and sent to the Kansas Association for Behavior Analysis, Department of Applied Behavioral Science, University of Kansas, 1000 Sunnyside Avenue, Lawrence, KS 66045. If purchased on-site, the CEUs are \$75 for the entire conference. Credit cards, checks, and cash are accepted. Certificates of attendance for the full conference attendance will be available gratis.

Career and Education Fair

KansABA will host a Career and Education Fair for direct-service providers, nonprofit government agencies, and

educational institutions. Registration is \$100 for direct-service providers. Government agencies and educational institutions register gratis. Registration includes one conference registration and its benefits (e.g., lunch). KansABA does not endorse providers, agencies, or institutions and reserves the right to refuse them registration for failing to adhere to the field's ethical standards (see J. S. Bailey & M.
